

Dr. Harry K. Newburn, dean of the college of liberal arts at the University of Iowa. was named president of the University of Oregon by the State Board of Higher Education at their January meeting, it was announced last week.

Dr. Newburn, who will head the state university which has been under the direction of Acting President Orlando John Hollis since the death of President Donald K. Erb in December, 1943, is recognized as one of the most outstanding younger educators in this country. Born in Cuba, Ill. January 1, he has just passed his 39th birthday.

A graduate of Western Illinois Teachers College Macomb, Ill., in 1928, the Oregon president-elect received his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees at the University of Iowa, taking the doctorate in 1933.

Beginning his career with five years service in Illinois schools in 1931 he went to the University of Iowa as part-time principal of the University high school. After receiving his doctorate degree he was made a full time staff member. He Vernon Munkers. Circ.
