## Housewives Urged To Salvage Fats

Home Economist of the U. S. department of agriculture urge housewives to continue to help the fat salvage program. Salvaged fats go into a pool of tallows and greases which supplies raw material for soap and industrial uses, including lubricants, synthetic rubber and other rubber processing, and textile and leather products. As long as imports of fats are below normal and military and other unusual demands are at high levels, the acquisition of every additional pound of reclaimed fats and the avoidance of waste in the use of products made from fats, are genuine contributions to our whole war economy.

Housewives are urged to strain fat before turning it in. Recent reports indicate an increasing percentage of non-fat material, including chunks of lean meat pieces of bone, and other material. The presence of meat in the salvaged fats causes deterioration.
