The first meeting of the Lexington Camp Cookery club was held

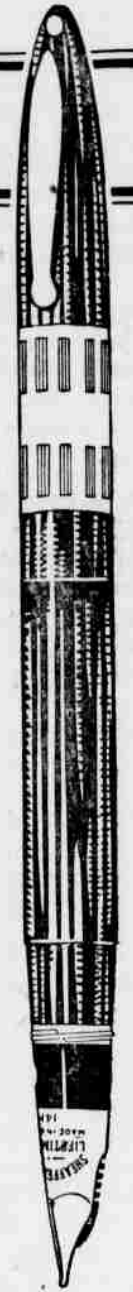
