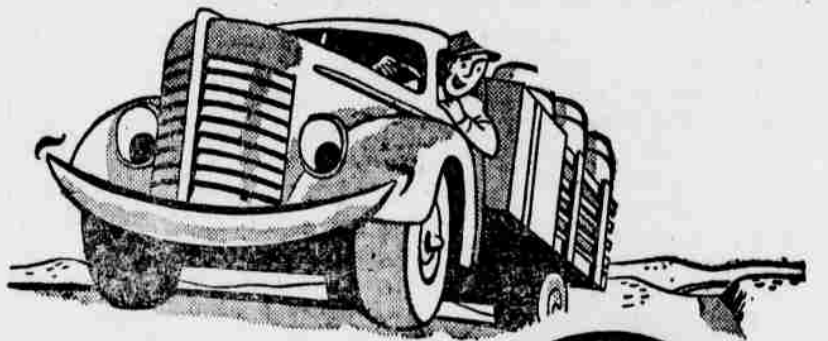
Yet when Herb comes home—too tired to talk or watch where
