MAIL FOR ARMY PERSONNEL OVER SEAS

The war department advises that effective March 1, 1946, parcels not exceeding 22 pounds in weight or 48 inches in length or 72 inches in weight and length combined containing articles requested by the addressee may be accepted for mailing to army personnel overseas.

Personal recordings, voice or instrumental, may now be accepted for mailing to Army personnel ever seas, provided they are suitably prepared for transmission through the mails and meet the requirements as to weight, size and request of the addressee. However, such recordings in parcels not exceeding 8 ounces in weight may be accepted for mailing at the first class rate of postage without the specific request of the addressee.
