

**Senators Report on Opposition to McNary Dam at Umatilla**

Opposition to construction of the McNary dam at Umatilla has been uncovered in Washington and the Oregon delegation in congress is being importuned to do something about it. Recently a letter supporting the dam was sent by the Heppner chamber of commerce to Senators Cordon and Morse and Rep. Lowell Stockman. Monday telegrams were read from the senators setting out their findings and their offers of assistance in stopping the opposition.

It appears that the state of Washington has a pet project of its own to develop and it cannot very well be pushed ahead with another big Columbia river project on the calendar.

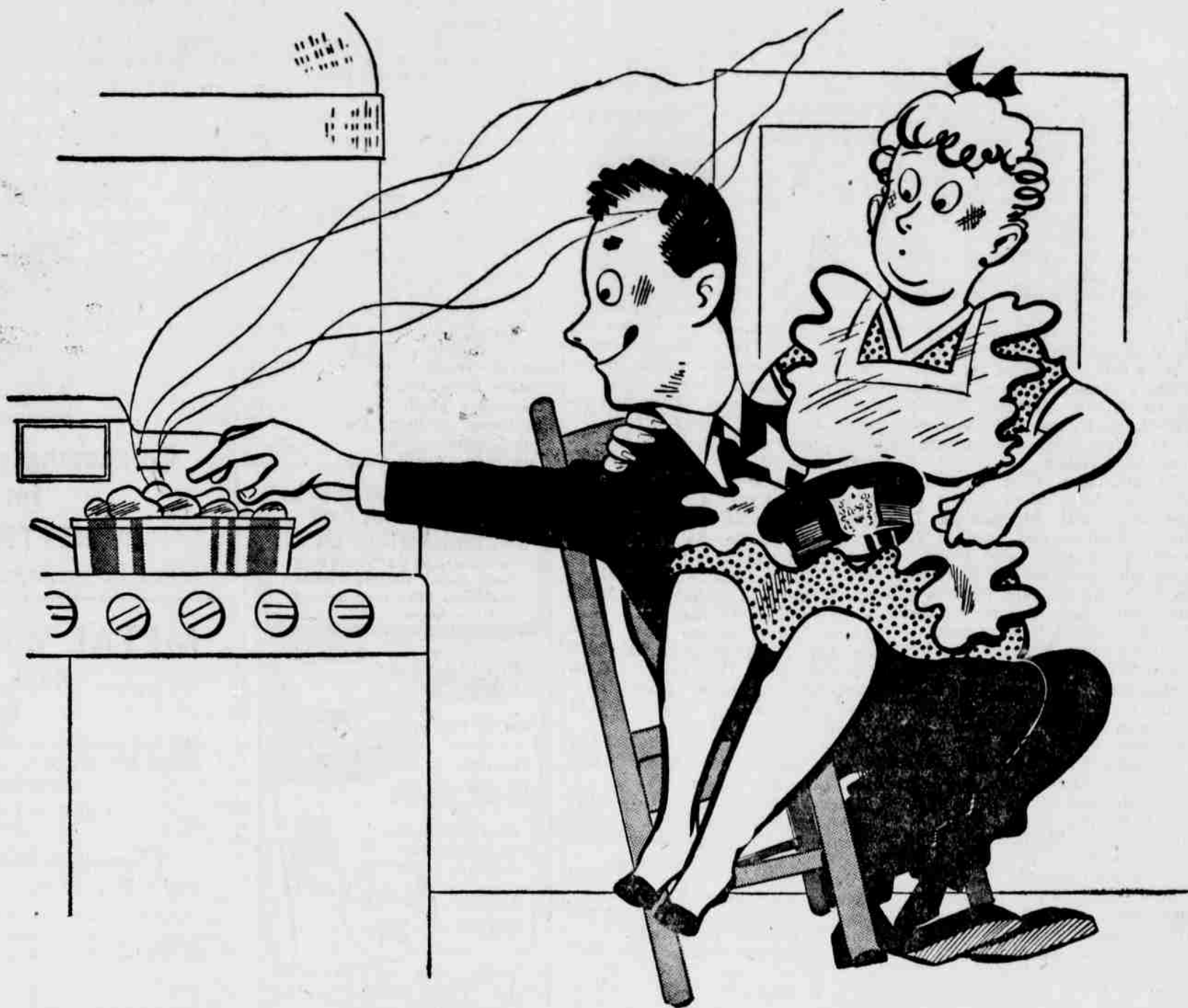

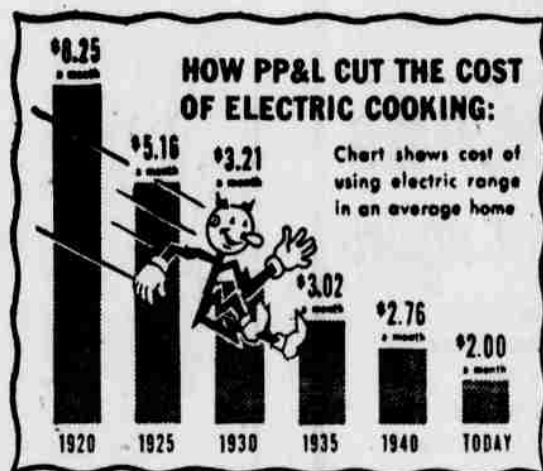
