

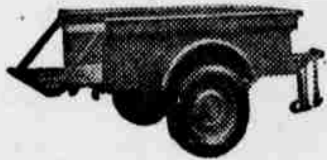
### Peck New Head of Insurance Corp'n. As Boegli Leaves

Willis C. Boegli, Oregon director for the Federal Crop Insurance corporation since the program was reestablished a year ago, has resigned to accept a position as agricultural economist with the regional office of the Bureau of Reclamation at Amarillo, Tex. George N. Peck, Lexington, eastern Oregon crop insurance supervisor, will be acting state director until Boegli's successor is named, the corporation has informed E. Harvey Miller, state PMA director.

Before becoming state FCIC director last spring, Boegli had been a district field man for the state AAA committee since 1937. He is a native of Jefferson county, and was graduated from Oregon State in 1926.

The acting director has announced that he will continue Boegli's policy of providing assistance to county AAA committees in carrying out provisions of the crop insurance program in Oregon. The immediate job, he said, is to expedite the filing of notices of seeding from the 3,000 Oregon wheat farms insured for 1946, since these notices determine both premiums and insured production. State FCIC headquarters will continue to be at the PMA office in the Eastern building, Portland.
