How do you eat milk? Why in the numerous delicious dishes which may be prepared with it—everything from soup to dessert!

Milk is truly a wonder food—because it contains invaluable minerals and has an alkalinizing effect on the body, drinking plenty of milk regularly will produce happy results for everyone. For luncheon serve hearty cream soups often, or tasty creamed foods on toast or biscuits. Make your vegetable soup with one-fourth vegetable cooking water and three-fourths milk. Use milk in oyster or clam chowder, in escalloping vegetables or eggs, in souffles or fondues.

For dinner serve your vegetables creamed for a change. Try baking veal cutlets, ham slices or fish filets in milk. Use milk gravies with fried chicken, veal or sausage. Introduce milk desserts such as creamy rich pud-

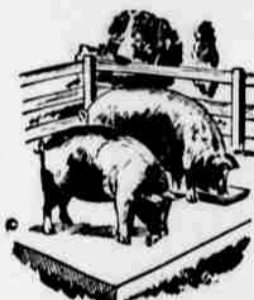
