**County Agent News**

This office has just received blanks for ordering forest trees for farm planting. The trees available for eastern Oregon farms this season are Douglas fir, Ponderosa pine, Scotch pine, Chinese arborvitae, Arizona cypress, black locust and Russian olive. These trees are available from the state forester at Salem at a cost of \$2.50 per thousand, with a minimum charge of 50 cents. f.o.b. the Oregon forest nursery, Corvallis. Orders must be received by March 1, 1948 to be filled.  
Order blanks and a circular on "Forest Trees for Farm Planting" are available from this office.  
The secretary of agriculture recently has called upon the extension through its county agents to begin work on a "Freedom Gardens" campaign to produce and preserve more food at home. This is necessary due to the desperate food situation abroad. The secretary stated, "By helping himself to meet increasing living costs, the home gardener will be helping his own community to make a precious contribution to a hungry world."  
While not so much will be said about the needs for more gardens at present, it is not a bit too early for planning your garden program for next spring. Now is the time to clean up your garden, removing any plants with signs of disease, fertilizing and planting the cover crop where this is a practice.

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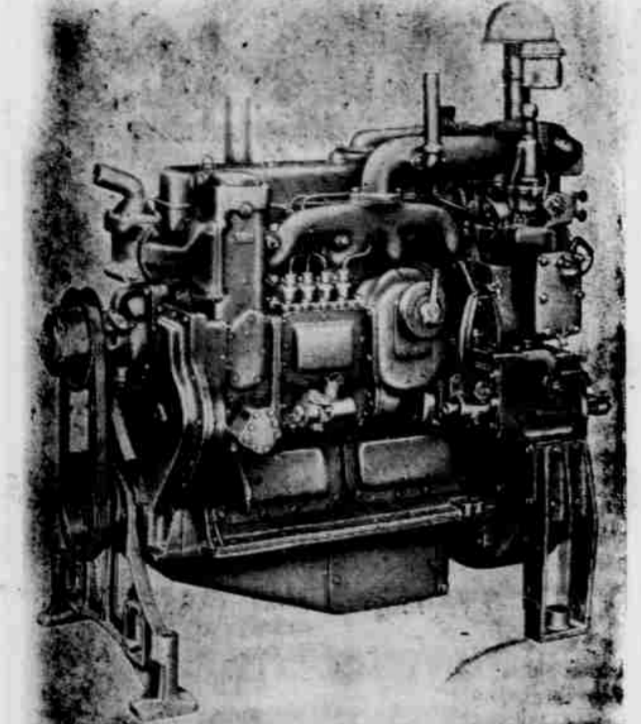
