What Average Citizens Read

Newspaper publishers sometimes wonder what their readers are interested in and to settle the question surveys are taken from time to time. One such survey, made by an Illinois publisher at the request of the Advertising Research Foundation to use his newspaper for a pilot study the agency wished to make of readership in the weekly field, came up with the following results:

Average readership, men 89 per cent, women 93 per cent; local news, 98 and 99; county news and advertising, 84 and 88; society news, county news and advertising, 91 and 95; editorials, county news and advertising, 93 and 88; society news and advertising, 84 and 99; local news, society news and advertising, 80 and 96; county news, servicemen's news and advertising, 80 and 96; religious news, local news, and advertising, 87 and 94; local news, county news and advertising, 85 and 86; classified advertising, 91 and 84, and general news and advertising, 99 and 99.

Each classification represented one of twelve pages of the paper and the percentages give the women an edge over the men. The survey proves the efficiency of the average country weekly as an advertising medium. An average readership of 89 per cent of the men and 93 per cent of the women is something in which potential advertisers are interested. Origin of Cattle Important

Officials of the state department of agriculture's division of animal industry have issued a precautionary warning to Oregon buyers and breeders of livestock to investigate the origin of cattle moving into Oregon. It is pointed out that the department has been authorizing the movement of cattle into Oregon from border states-Arizona, Texas and southern California areas-subject to Oregon State Game Comquarantine upon arrival and 30-day observation. This is a precautionary measure against any possible introduction of foot and mouth disease, James M. McCabe, coyote which is not known to be present in any border

In view of presence of foot and mouth disease in Mexico, state livestock sanitary officials feel that The Court drew the following names every effort must be made to protect herds in this state. The problem is complicated by several factors, including the present heavy movement of cattle which makes it almost impossible for officials to keep their thumbs upon every lot of cattle entering Oregon borders.

The movement of cattle through auction sales yards presents a problem in livestock sanitation, the department says. Some of the cattle marketed in this manner have come from earlier auctions in Nebraska and South Dakota and from direct country sales in other western states. It is probabie that some of the cattle have originated in states bordering Mexico and for that reason officials urge full cooperation of buyers with the precautionary measures being undertaken by the de-
