Licensee Employees Must Have Permits By November 1st

Portland, Oregon (Special)—William Hatley, supervisor of enforcement for the Oregon liquor control commission, has issued a reminder to all employees of licensees of the commission who serve, sell, or mix alcoholic beverages that they must have the new permits and identification cards required by regulation 19 on November 1.

Hately also issued an order to all inspectors of the enforcement division to the effect that they were to begin a systematic check on November 1 of all establishments in their respective districts to ascertain if all those required to have permits have complied with the commission order.

Regulation 19 was passed by the regulatory body might have better control of the sale of alcoholic beverages in the state by making the licensee responsible for the sale and service of beverages. In the past, the licensee has borne the full responsibility for the sale of alcoholic beverages on his premises.

Application blanks are available from all inspectors, state liquor stores, the commission offices in Salem and Portland, and from licensees whose employees come under the regulation.

BILL AMENDING LICENSING AND ACQUISITION PROVISIONS OF HYDROELECTRIC COMMISSION ACT
