If the machine, for any reason, was left out in water out of bearing areas and protect these surfaces from rusting. A coating of grease or rust-proof compound should be applied to all polished parts to pre-vent rusting, such as moldboards and shares on plows. All imple ments on rubber tires should be jacked up or blocked up off the ground to take pressure off rub per tires and prevent rusting of steel wheels, if there is danger of water draining under it.
