25 in March, exceeding the toll combined. Secretary of State Earl C. Newberry reported today.

March fatalities add to the 12 deaths reported in January and the seven charged to February accidents to bring Oregon losses for the first quarter of 1949 to 44. The same period of 1948 saw 83 lives lost.

Fatality reports received to date show 19 of the March deaths took place on rural highways and six inside cities and towns. Four persons died in Portland traffic accidents during the month.

Newberry said the return of warmer weather and consequent increase in volume and speed of highway traffic is bringing a sharp rise in high-speed accidents. He said at least 13 of the March fatalities were directly traceable to excessive speed.
