4-H Show And Sale To Draw Exhibits From Over State

Exhibitors and entries of wheat fed livestock for the third annual Oregon Wheat Growers League 4-H Show and Sale at The Dalles, June 6, 7 and 8 will set new show records, predicted Manager Eugene Courtney.

About 135 boys and girls have indicated their intention to show their livestock, compared to 99 last year. On display will be about 135 fat steers, 85 lambs, and 66 hogs. This year entries will be permitted from all wheat growing areas in the state.

Climaxing the show again this year will be the auction sale of prime meat animals on the final night of the event, at The Dalles auction yards, with Auctioneer Frank Wink and his sons in charge.

Banquets and other entertainment, including a boat ride on the Columbia river, again have been planned by the operating board.
