RANDOM THOTS . . .

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 There is a platform about 2 feet in length, underneath which are six rotary blades which cut the stubble off at about six inches above the ground. This reduces the stubble to a state where the discs can chop it up and work it into the surface of the ground. (This is getting a little too technical, so with the suggestion that you, gentle reader, go out and see the machine in operation, we will pass to another subject).
 Newt O'Harra has a field of yellow clover in the creek bottom back of his residence at Lexington which proves the wisdom of diversifying crops. Grown without irrigation, the clover has made a heavy stand. It also has made it difficult for weeds to get much of a start in the field. Since this is the second year and the clover will grow only two years to a seeding, Newt will be able to put the land into spinach or cucumbers in the spring, if he so desires.
 E. R. Jackman, without whom a field tour in Oregon would not be a complete success, was commenting on the value of treating fence posts before "planting." He told about riding around the pasture with Ike Weatherford when all of a sudden Ike cut loose with a mild oath, stopped the car and pointed to some new fencing the hired man had been putting in. "See what that blanket-blank hired man did? About half of those posts were put in with the treated end up!" Jackman said he thought it was essential, to get the best results, to put the treated end of the post in the ground.
