COUNTY AGENT NEWS

July 24 through 30 is National Farm Safety Week. There is no significance in this week however unless our farm people practice farm safety all during the year.

This week is declared primarily for farm people to stop and realize what they can do to make their farms and daily life more safe.

Example of some of the accident hazards found on the farm are facts given to us by the Oregon Farm Safety Council. F. E. Price, Assistant Dean, Oregon State College, is chairman of this council. 3,000 farm accidents occurred on Oregon farms during the past year. 15 of these deaths were caused by tractors with 27 deaths reported as a result of farm work accidents. Cause of deaths in Oregon followed no definite pattern. They were caused by everything from a falling building, runaway horse, and a bull, to electrocution.
