Leon Briggs Was Resident of State More Than 80 Years

Leon Winfield Briggs was born July 10, 1859 at Wellsville N. Y., the son of Clark N. and Eunice Symonds Briggs. In 1868 the family moved to Salem, Oregon and four years later, 1872, came to that part of Umatilla county now embraced in Morrow county. The family then moved to Weston Mountain where Leon resided until he attained the age of 20 years. He lived a short time in Vancouver, Wash., then came to Alkali, now Arlington, returning to Heppner in 1881 to work in the general store owned by Henry Heppner and Henry Blackman. Throughout his long life here he was employed in various businesses requiring the services of a bookkeeper. He served as Heppner city treasurer and was county treasurer at the time of his passing, a position he held for many years. He was a charter member of Heppner lodge No. 69, A.F. & A.M. which was instituted 70 years ago. He also was a long time member and faithful servant of the Methodist church. In 1886 Mr. Briggs was married to Hannah French, who preceded him in death in December 1939. To this union was born Eunice Ruth, who lost her life in the June 14, 1903 flood; Opal Dell Briggs and Loia (Mrs. Ray Taylor), who survive, and Julius French Briggs, who died in 1922. Other survivors include five grandsons, two great grandsons, and several nieces and nephews.
