

Bill Reynolds Of Monument Victim of Shooting Accident

Bill Reynolds was accidentally shot Saturday as he was walking up a mountainside to his work Dr. Jerry and the ambulance from John Day were called as soon as a man could run to the nearest phone. There were several men working nearby and they carried him to Bernel Corbin's pickup and a "cat" was used to push them through the mud out to the county road. They met the doctor and ambulance several miles on the other side

of Kimberly. From John Day he was flown to Portland. Word was received Sunday that he was in a very critical condition but still holding his own. His wife and children left early Sunday morning for Portland. Mr. Reynolds was shot by Tureman Craddock, a soldier boy, home on a short leave. The boys were target shooting and the general opinion seems to be that the bullet must have hit a limb and ricocheted to hit Mr. Reynolds.

Later—Mr. Reynolds passed away at the Providence Hospital in Portland about eleven o'clock Sunday night. He is survived by his wife Stella and three children, two sons and a daughter. L. D. Vincent and Mrs. Reynolds' sister, Lois Fuzek left here at one a. m. Monday for Portland.

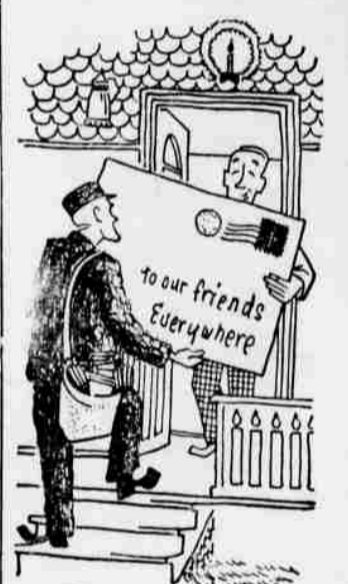
