

## Indonesian Missionary At Lexington Church

Dr. John G. Breman, Founder and director of the American Gospel Mission of Indonesia, with his wife and daughter, Henrietta, will be guest speaker of the Congregational and Christian Churches of Lexington at a public service on Friday, August 3 at eight o'clock in the evening.

Dr. and Mrs. Breman established the Mission among the Dyaks in 1926 to 1933. After a furlough in the States they returned in 1935 to work among the tree dwellers of Malaya and the Sakais. Later they expanded to reach the Orang Laut, the sea pirates of the Notoena Islands. In 1941 Mrs. Breman and Henrietta



returned to the States to set up housekeeping with the other four children who had remained behind for education. Dr. Breman was to follow in a few months but the war stopped that.

Dr. Breman became a member of the Local Allied Underground in Batavia, Java with the responsibility of supplying foodstuffs and medical supplies for the women and children of that area. His underground activities resulted in repeated arrests and releases by the Japanese occupation. Eventually he was taken with 1264 others to the "Horror Camp" of Ambarawa in mid Java. For three years he was subjected to the horrors of the prison camp from which he came as the sole survivor of the group that was taken with him. The story of those three years would

## Umatilla Experiment Station Field Day Set

The annual Field Day at the Umatilla Branch Experiment Station will be held Wednesday, August 1. Field tours will start at 9:00 a.m. and continue throughout the morning. All visitors are invited to bring a picnic lunch and eat on the Station grounds at noon. In the afternoon, there will be a discussion period and demonstration.

Research work that can be observed on field day include fertilization of field corn, carrot production, weed sprays, sunflower fertilization, irrigation methods and equipment, including sprinkler irrigation, grass and legume nursery, irrigated pastures, alfalfa, alfalfa varieties and sweet corn varieties. The station laboratory and equipment will be on display and a number of exhibits will be available for observation, showing the results of Experiment Station research work.

All irrigation farmers and interested persons in the area should mark down August 1 as the day to visit their Experiment Station, and get acquainted with the research workers and the work now in progress.

## Forest Fire Danger Higher Than In Years

How do you report a forest fire? Keep Oregon Green headquarters advises the process is very simple. Just go to the nearest telephone and say: "I want to report a forest fire." The operator will connect you with the nearest fire warden.

This was the information given by Keep Oregon Green County Chairman Judge Barratt of Morrow County in a stepped up drive to catch forest fires before they spread.

Said the county chairman: "This is the worst fire danger year in the past third of a century. We must prevent every possible man-caused blaze. Any fire today is a potential killer of people and destroyer of timber, payrolls and jobs. We need the full-time support of every man, woman and child."

"No rain has fallen of consequence since the last of March," the fire prevention leader stated. "There is little hope for the rest of the summer. We urge every citizen of this county to appoint himself a committee of one to stop forest fires for the duration."

Fire protection leaders in the Heppner area are Wayne W. West, District Ranger; Kenneth H. Keeling, Forester; Whitmer G. Wright, Fire Control Aid.

## Data on Oregon Meat Animals And Wool Available

Farm production of meat animals in the state two years ago amounted to more than 400 million pounds liveweight. It is recorded in a new Oregon State college extension bulletin, number 718, entitled, "Oregon's Meat Animals and Wool," which is now ready for distribution through county extension offices.

The 24-page publication is a statistical yearbook containing estimates on numbers, prices, and income for the years 1925 to 1951. It was compiled by OSC extension agricultural economists. The bulletin includes information on cattle, sheep and wool, and hogs as well as cash receipts and price data.

More money is received by Oregon farmers from meat animals and wool than from any of the 12 farm commodity groups for which statistical yearbooks are prepared, the economists declare. Cash receipts from farm marketings was \$93,550,000 last year as compared with \$29,048,000 in 1940.

Income from cattle and calves accounted for almost three-fourths of the total received from meat animals and wool.

In 1949, the last year for which figures are complete, Malheur county led in cattle and calf production, Douglas led in sheep and lamb production, and Wallowa was the state's leading swine producing county.

Wool production, the bulletin says, has been on a steady decline since 1934 with the exception of 1941 when there was only a slight increase from the year before and 1950 which showed a 3 percent increase over 1949. Yet the 1950 wool clip was only one-half the 1939-48 average.

The total number of cattle on Oregon farms on January 1 this year was 1 percent greater than on the same date in 1950. While milk cows have decreased, beef

cow numbers have been on the rise. Copies of the bulletin are also available directly from the college.
