Cool, Ventilated Spot Best For Home Freezer

For those Morrow County farmers and townspeople alike, who are installing freezers, "pamper your freezer" is the advice of Mary Beth Minden Oregon State College extension home management specialist, in discussing where to put the homefreezer. She says the ideal location is a cool, dry, well-ventilated place. Circulation of air is needed to carry off the heat of freezer operation, so the freezer should not be fitted tightly into a niche with walls on three sides, she warns.

The freezer also needs a floor strong enough to support it. Even an empty freezer is heavy, and a full load of food may add several hundred pounds. Up right freezers put more weight per square foot on a floor than horizontal ones of the same capacity. A solidly built floor also cuts the operation noise.

Before freezer and location are decided on to be sure that the freezer will fit the space and that it will go through doors and narrow halls, around corners, and up or down stairs if necessary.
