OSC Aids Study To Standardize Frozen Foods

For Morrow County farmers contemplating such a purchase, size is a big question when buying a home freezer, according to Mary Beth Minden, extension home management specialist at Oregon State College.

Six cubic feet of freezer space per person will meet the needs of most families. If freezing is to supplement canning, or if a locker plant is to serve as the main means of storage, three cubic feet per person may be ample. But when most of the family food is stored in the home freezer storage times for various foods overlap, 10 cubic feet per person may not be too much.

Some families prefer two med-

ium freezers to one large one. says Miss Minden. For some, the largest home freezer may be too small.

There are other advantages in having two freezers. One can be used mostly for freezing, and the other for storage. When the food supply gets low, everything can be stored in one freezer and the other disconnected, so that oper-

ating costs are reduced. In case one freezer is out of order, only part of the frozen food supply has to be taken care of.

So although the initial cost is bigger for two small or medium-sized freezers than for one large one with an equal amount of space, the advantages may outweigh the cost.

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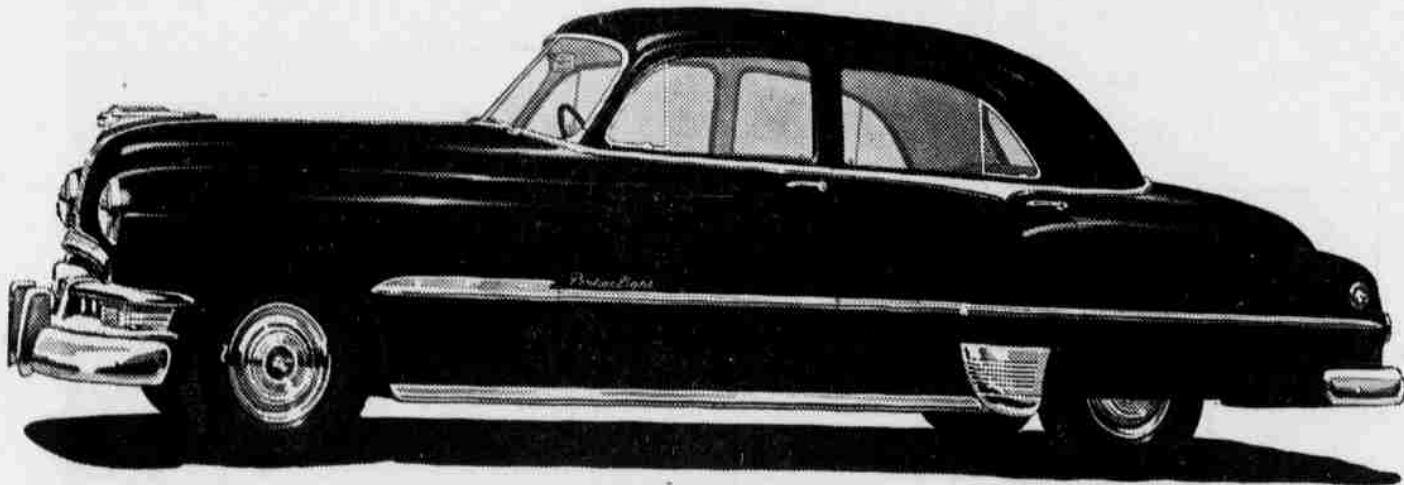
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
