Purposes of Kindergarten Told

(ARTICLE II)

The program of the kindergarten is planned so as to teach children clean health habits, how to put on and remove outdoor clothing, respect for others' rights, neatness, ability to work together, appreciation of a time schedule, ability to work individually for long periods of time and to complete a piece of work.

A typical two-hour kindergarten session will probably start with an informal opening in which roll is called, a song or two is enjoyed, and interesting adventures or toys are shared by the children. Activity period, in which the children play with toys, dramatize stories, do art work, or use their pre-reading workbooks, is about forty-five minutes in length. After a short rest period the youngsters wash their hands and eat a snack of crackers and milk, jello, or fruit juice. Story hour and music, following a ten minute recess outdoors, conclude the session.

Occasionally the children go on a field trip, to visit public school, a farm, the library or post office, or various business houses. The session is at all times an elastic one and informal.

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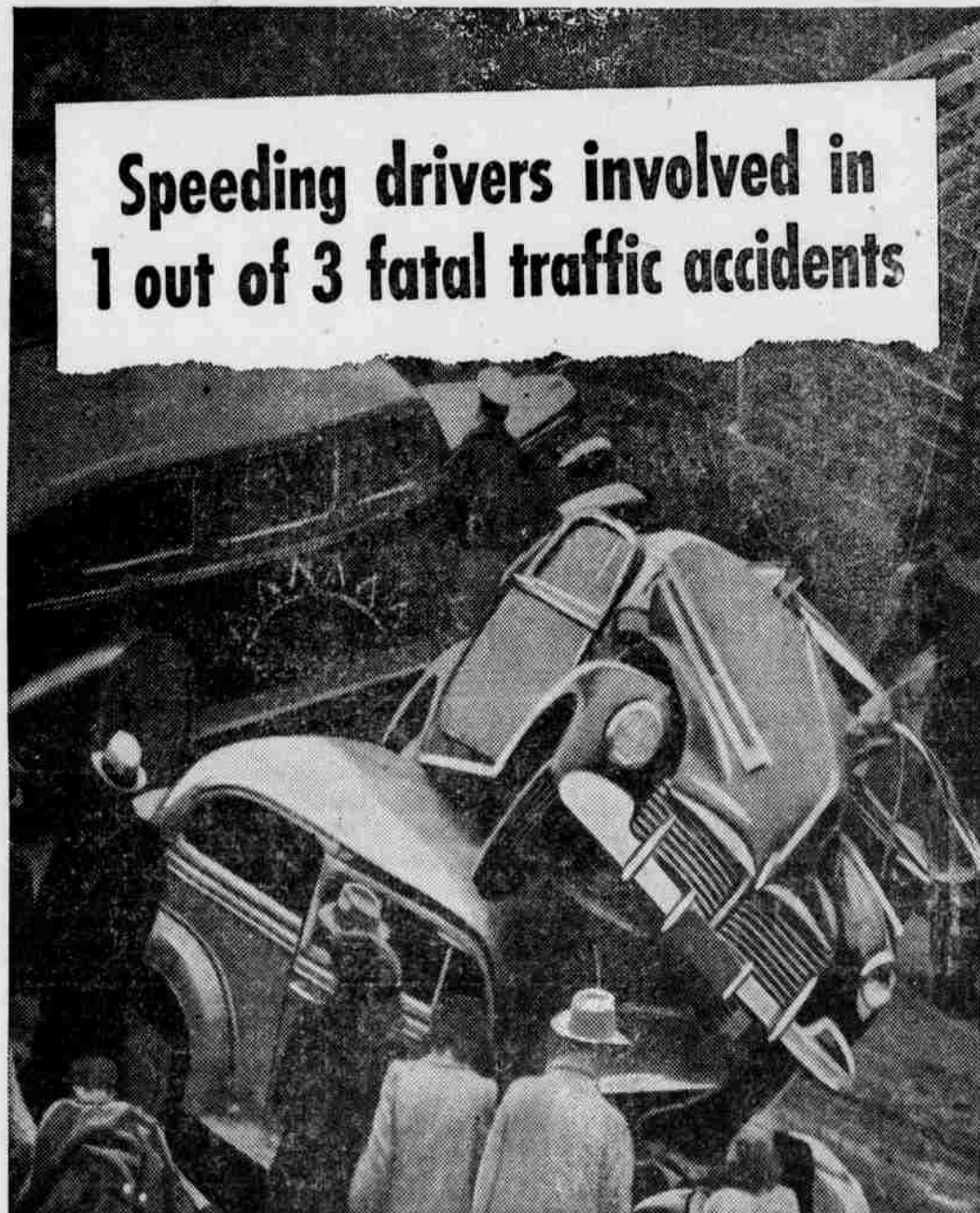
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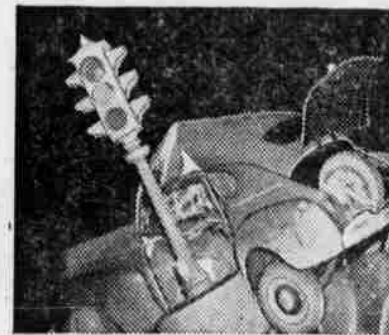


Watch out—the time you save by speeding may be spent in the cemetery. According to official traffic records, speed is the most frequently reported violation in fatal traffic accidents.
