

Heppner High Registers Over 100, Staff Filled

Registration of high school students at Heppner high school was nearly complete Thursday with over 100 students having signed for classes during the first three days of the week, according to L. L. Pate, principal.

Around 20 more students are expected to register when school starts next Monday. All grade students will register on Monday.

Pate stated that all staff positions are filled for the coming year, the one place still open last week will be taken by James Peterson who will arrive from North Dakota. He will teach the 7th and 8th grades.

Parents are reminded again that grade pupils should bring the necessary fee money with them when they register on Monday and Pate again asked that parents of any new child living in the rural areas contact him immediately that bus drivers may be advised of the child's address so that none will be missed when buses start regular runs next week.

Today and Friday all county teachers are gathered at the Heppner school for their regular pre-school workshop. The meetings started Thursday morning and are under the direction of Leslie E. Grant, county school superintendent.

The squad traveled to Pendleton Wednesday afternoon, and scrimmaged the "Buckaroo A squad". Although they were not impressive in their playing, Coach Whitbeck figured they had come a long ways and were definitely on the upswing.

An additional 8 to 12 players are expected out for practice as soon as school gets under way Monday, September 10.

Morning practices are being held the latter part of this week so as not to interfere with the Heppner Fair and Rodeo performances.
