

Maupin Clips Mustangs 20-7; Echo Night Game Next

A very strong aggressive Maupin football squad defeated an over-confident Heppner team by a 20-7 score last Friday on the Maupin home turf.

Maupin immediately began a scoring punch as they recovered a partially blocked punt by full-back Jack Sumner and turned the recovery into 6 points. Heppner was unable to penetrate a rugged Maupin line and surrendered the ball and Maupin immediately capitalized on a long pass behind the Heppner secondary and this combined with a pair of strong running plays booster the score to a 13-0 halftime lead.

Heppner came back strong in the third quarter and immediately scored on a pass from quarter-

back Smith to right end Gary Connor, who made an exciting twisting run of 28 yards through the Maupin sentinals. The same combination added the extra point.

This ended the Heppner scoring, but Maupin scored a third and final time on the same long pass behind the Heppner secondary. Tackle Mickey Lanham and backs Roland Taylor and John Wagner were all of Heppners defense, while Wendell Connor and Gary Connor were offensive standouts.

Echo Game Friday Night
This Friday, is the only night game of the season, the Echo Bulldogs will play host to the Heppner "11" in a game that begins at 8:00 p.m. Echo took Heppner into camp last year by a score of 38-0. Heppner has vowed, to the man, to avenge this and an excellent evening of football is in store. Echo is lead by a strong backfield unit with four fast backs and two very fine defensive ends.

Heppnerites On OSC Committee

James J. Farley, Mrs. Phil Mahoney and Ralph Thompson of Heppner have been selected on the special committee that will carry the Oregon State college alumni association's campaign for funds for the new OSC stadium into Morrow county beginning this week.

The Morrow county campaign is part of the statewide drive launched this month. This is the first drive for stadium funds held outside of Corvallis and Portland, Charles T. Parker of Portland, state chairman, said. More than \$250,000 of the approximately \$700,000 expected to be needed for the modern stadium has been contributed.

Although government restrictions will prevent immediate start of construction of the stadium, college officials discussed preliminary plans with engineers early in September.

Present plans call for a permanent covered stand seating 16,000 and a similar uncovered stand of the same size. Provision will be made for any needed expansion in the future. The structure will be located just southwest of the new coliseum. Dressing room and shower facilities in the coliseum were planned for use by football squads.

The site for the new stadium has been provided by the state and approved by the state board of higher education, but state funds are not available for such structures. Dr. A. L. Strand, president of OSC, pointed out at the start of the project that the only possible way a stadium can be built is through voluntary gifts of alumni and friends of the college.
