Oregon Wheat Treated With Pyrenone Protectant



More than 40,000 bushels of wheat in the recent Oregon harvest were treated with a new-type insecticide, Pyrenone Wheat Protectant, on farms in The Dalles area. Designed as a preventive of insect infestation for wheat in storage, Pyrenone Protectant is shown being applied in two ways above: left, it is mixed with the wheat on the combine, and, right, it is scattered over the surface of a truckload, and then mixed in with a shovel. Tests have shown that the insecticide, a powder which adheres to the wheat kernels, will provide protection of wheat for at least one storage season. It is applied either at storage or in turning.

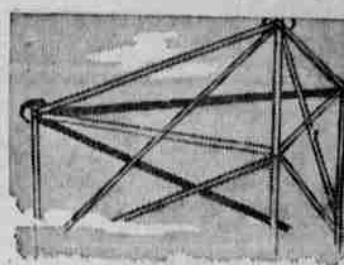

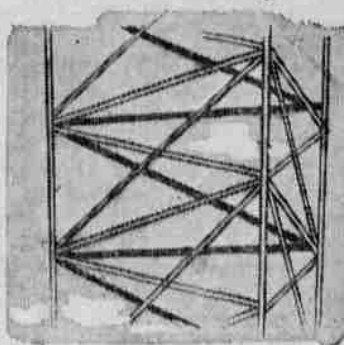
Mrs. Hugh Brown motored to Hermiston Tuesday afternoon to attend the R.E.A. meeting.
