

COURT PROCEEDINGS
FOR AUGUST, 1951

The minutes of the July term were read and approved.

The Court allowed the following Bangs' Disease Claims: Rollo E. Moore \$8.00; Gilmer T. Bolton \$8.00.

The Court ordered the amount of \$1,050.00 in the Rodent Appropriation fund for the control of Predatory animals or so much thereof as shall be matched with an equal amount of Oregon State Game Commission funds, in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for predatory animal control in Morrow County.

The Court ordered the sum of \$885.00 out of the Rodent Appropriation fund, said sum to be matched with an equal amount by the State of Oregon for the use of the United States Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Biological Survey in the control of predatory animals in Morrow County.

The Court ordered the sale of the following property: Lots 2 & 3 in Blocks West Section 25, Township 5 North, Range 26 E. W.M. containing 10 acres more or less for the minimum price of \$224.00 cash.

Lots 1, 3, 4, 5 and 7 in Block 3 West, Section 25, Township 5 North, Range 26 E. W.M. containing 30.53 acres more or less for minimum price of \$390.00 cash.

Northwest Quarter of Section 24, township 2 North, Range 26, E. W. M. containing 160 acres more or less for the minimum price of \$240.00 cash.

The Court ordered Dance Hall license issued to School District No. 25, Boardman, Oregon.

The Court agrees to pay overtime to its County Road employees at the rate of time and half for all hours worked over 44 hours per week in compliance with Chapter 638, 1951 Oregon Laws. This to be only temporary arrangement and subject to change as in said law provided.

Ore. Vets Reminded
Of State Benefits
For Education

With the fall term of school at hand, Oregon veterans of World War II and the Korean war were reminded this week they may be entitled to educational benefits from the state of Oregon ranging up to \$50 for each month of school attendance. Edward T. Taggart, educational officer for the state Department of Veterans' Affairs, which administers the program, pointed out that the veterans who lived in Oregon for one year just prior to service either in World War II or the Korean war, and who served six months or more, are eligible for the benefits.

They pay a qualified veteran \$50 for each month he attends college as a full time undergraduate student, or \$35 for studies in any other school which requires 40 hours of classroom attendance monthly. They are also payable in smaller amounts for part-time studies. The student may draw one month's benefits for each month he served in the armed forces, up to 36 months.

"Oregon's educational aid program should prove especially helpful to veterans who want to continue their studies, now that the federal GI program has expired for most of them," Taggart said. No deadline has been set on the Oregon grant.

More than 4800 Oregon veterans have studied under the state assistance program since it was established for World War II veterans in 1945. The 1951 legislature extended the benefits, to Oregon-servicemen who have been in service since June 25, 1950; and prior to the termination
