

From The County Agent's Office

As cattle herds are brought in from the summer range or pastures changed as calves are weaned, consideration should be given to taking a few additional hours for spraying of cattle. This is the time of year for lice control. Too frequently this job is left too long for best results. Treatment is easier now while animal hair is shorter for better penetration of spray. Lice infestations have not yet built up to the numbers that infest during the winter months.

No big changes have been made in recommendations for lice control. Methoxychlor, DDT, rotenone, and a new one to Morrow County ranchers, pyrethrum-piperonyl butoxide combinations are the insecticides used. Methoxychlor and DDT are used at the rate of 10 pounds 50 per cent wettable powder per 100 gallons of water. Rotenone at the rate of 1 pound 5 per cent material to 100 gallons of water gives good results if two treatments spaced at intervals of two to three weeks are made.

The pyrethrum-piperonyl butoxide combination should be used at the dilution recommended by the manufacturer.

Other insecticides such as chlordane, lindane, TDE, and benzene hexachloride have also been used effectively to control cattle lice. They should be used with discretion on younger animals.

To do an effective, complete job of spraying, it usually requires about two gallons of spray material per mature animal. The spray should be put on at a pressure of at least 300 pounds. Pressure less than 300 pounds does not fully penetrate the hair for best application and more spray is required.

A new Oregon State College outlook circular will be in the mail for many Morrow County

farmers this week. The outlook circular brings to the attention of ranchers that expanding livestock numbers will push feed grain prices higher next year unless production of such grains are increased considerably with increasing sheep and cattle numbers, hay stocks may be smaller next spring and more hay and pasture seedlings will be needed.

Support prices for 1952 on most grains are about the same or a little higher than this past year. Meanwhile, supplies and machinery costs next year are bound to rise since recent adjustments in price ceilings are permitting markups on many manufactured items.

Barring weather disaster, wheat is again in a good position to produce good incomes again next year since support prices are expected to hold markets near recent levels.

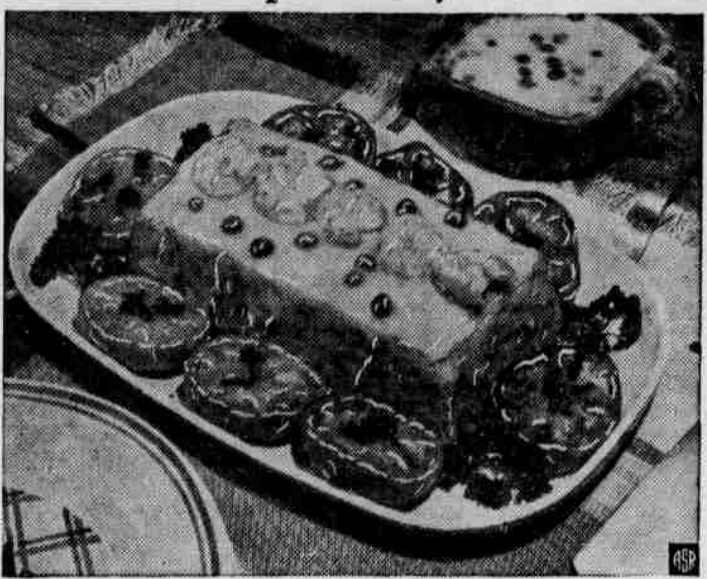
Morrow County ranchers have made headlines again. With all of the major October issue farm papers carrying stories on the increased effort toward Brucellosis control our ranchers are well along on the road to eradication.

It would be well worth everyone's time to read the article on Brucellosis control appearing in the October issues of "Country Gentleman" and "Farm Journal." Both articles carry much good information on the disease as well as outlining control programs that will be put into effect in all states.

If particular interest is the map showing percentages of infestation throughout the United States. In checking the map of Oregon, Morrow is the only Eastern Oregon county showing an infestation of less than 1 per cent Bangs disease. Western Oregon, due to its dairy herds and compulsory testing is the only other area with this low infestation in this state.

Only three years ago, Morrow County ranchers, through a recommendation of the County Agricultural Planning Conference,

Shrimp Loaf

2 eggs
1 cup milk

1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Beat eggs, combine with milk, add soft bread crumbs and shredded canned shrimp, chopped parsley, salt and pepper. Mix well and pack into well-oiled loaf pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 45 minutes. Turn out on platter and serve with grilled tomato halves and Pimiento Pea Sauce. YIELD: 6 servings.
