Bless those veal and beef soup bones! And pamper them for best results. First brown in the oven with onion, carrots and celery leaves. Then simmer all slowly with peppercorns and other seasonings to make a superb stock.

Pin up your pockets, ladies! Big pockets are the highlight of many a new dress this Fall and if the dress is plain you'll want to accent the pocket with a big, beautiful pin.

Set off your Fall fruit salads with this gorgeous tasting real mayonnaise dressing. Gently combine real mayonnaise and whipped cream. Add a speck of confectioners' sugar. Then fold in chopped grapes and nuts.

To make good grooming easier for the youngsters, devote two pockets of the shoe bag to "sprucing up" material, one to shoe polish equipment, such as black and brown shoe polishes, a cleaning cloth and brush. In the other pocket goes a clothes brush.

When fresh parsley or celery leaves get that "tired look"—put them in a pan in a warm oven and dry out. Then store in tightly covered jars for soups, stews and gravies.
