Local Bank Deposits Show 3-Month Gain

Figures released today by the Heppner branch of the First National Bank of Portland show that on September 29 1951 deposits at the branch were \$5,804,165 and loans were \$1,046,696. Announcement of the totals was made by branch manager Howard Bryant in keeping with First National's policy of releasing statement of condition figures every three months.

Comparable totals for the branch for September 30, 1950, were also released at the same time. On that date, deposits were \$5,128,320 and loans were \$2,672,122.

Further figures show that on September 29, 1951, deposits at the First National Bank of Portland with its 46 statewide banking offices set a new record for that date by reaching \$520,674,711 while loans on September 29 were at a new high of \$273,332,477. Resources at the bank also set a new September 29 record this year at \$566,423,225.

These figures represent an increase over September 30 a year ago of \$26,040,123 in deposits, \$55,757,458 in loans and \$30,220,140 in resources.

New highs in deposits, loans and resources were also set by the First National Bank group, consisting of the First National Bank of Portland and its 46 statewide banking offices and 15 affiliated banks with 18 offices. On September 29, 1951, deposits were \$649,072,181, loans were \$318,682,863 and resources were \$704,277,273.

Over September 30 of last year, the First National Bank group deposits increased \$36,152,013, loans increased \$69,467,210, and resources increased \$41,833,299.

Frank N. Belgrano, Jr., president of First National, pointed out that this record volume of business at the bank reflects the general high employment level and productive rate which has prevailed throughout Oregon during 1951. He commented that during the past summer less than 3% of Ore.'s workers were unemployed and that 7% more lumber has been marketed by Oregon sawmills during 1951 than for the same period last year.

Also, Belgrano added, the yields of many farm crops have been higher than last year and, in spite of an unusually dry summer, no extensive farm losses have been reported.
