

Prairie City Falls Before Heppner 50-0, Umatilla Next

Heppner's Mustangs opened things with a bang Friday when Wendell Connor took Prairie City's opening kickoff and galloped 84 yards for the first touchdown to set the tempo of the game. The Mustangs wound up the afternoon track meet on the long end of a 50 to 0 score.

Coach Hal Whitbeck used reserves entirely during the 2nd and 4th quarters, and at other times during the game which was played on the Prairie City field.

Ball carriers on touchdown plays were Jack Sumner (2), on drives of 14 and 6 yards, Jack Wagner (2) on runs of 28 and 4 yards, Lynn Rill, 13 yards; Roland Taylor, 1 yard and Gary Connor on a 17 yard pass from quarterback Jim Smith.

The Mustangs tackle Umatilla Friday in their second home game scheduled to start at 2:15. Whitbeck stated he expects a close game as it is usually a grudge battle and will probably be a passing game on Umatilla's part. Heppner won last year 19-6.

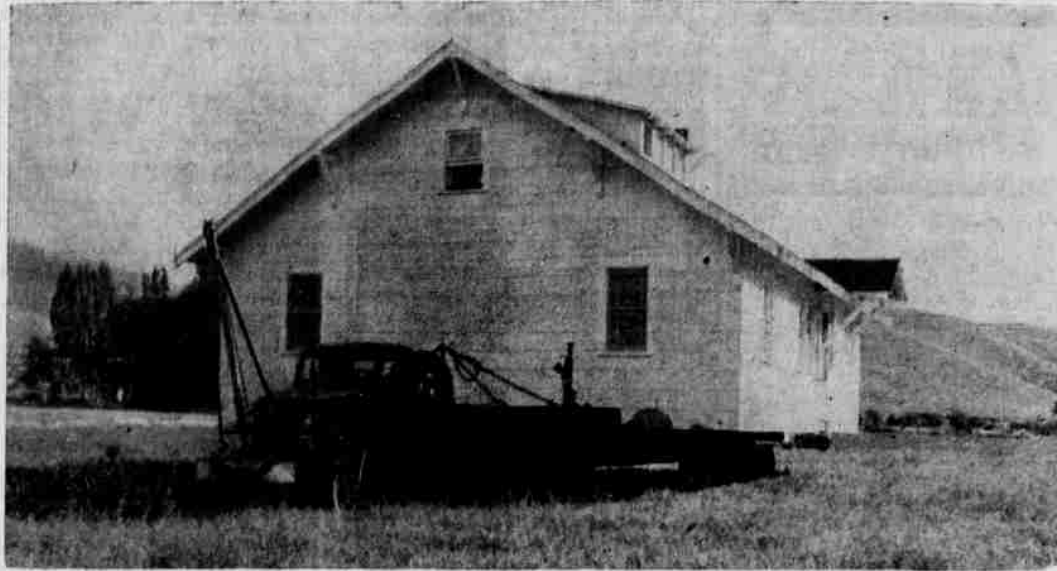
All Heppner boys are in good condition and a wide-open game is assured.
