

Sunday Ceremony Unites Couple at St. Patrick's Church

At a three o'clock ceremony Sunday afternoon at St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church, Miss Francine Ann Hisler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul A. The bride, given in marriage by her father, was lovely in a gown of white Chantilly lace en traine over white satin. The fitted bodice was finished in a plunging neckline with scallops fastened onto a yoke of illusion which was caught at the neckline edging finished with seed pearls at bottom and top of yoke. The buttons down the back of the bodice and on the long pointed sleeves were of white satin. The skirt was made over crinoline giving a hoop effect. The fingertip veil was of matching Chantilly lace held by a Juliet cap of illusion with seed pearl trim. Hepner Soroptimists Hostesses At Baker Regional Conference

The 32nd regional conference of the American Federation of Soroptimist Clubs was held in Baker October 11, 12, and 13 with Northwestern Regional Director, Mrs. Esther Wade Hughey, Helena, Montana as presiding officer and delegates and members from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Northern Idaho and Montana present for the sessions.

The Hepner Soroptimist Club was hostess Friday evening for the "All Western Supper" in the Mirror Room of the Hotel Baker.

Mrs. Clara Gertson, president, was chairman with Mrs. Lucy E. Rodgers reading the collect and Mrs. Etta Cuning, Baker, conference chairman, introducing the Federation and regional officers.

For entertainment a quiz program, patterned after Dr. I. Q., was presented with Mrs. Gertson, attired in cap and gown and horned rimmed spectacles, acting as quizmaster and other members of the Hepner group as her assistants. Noisemakers were given to persons making correct answers and the unlucky ones were fined a dime for incorrect answers to questions.

This money was presented to the Baker club for its conference fund. The tables were decorated with arrangements of Juniper foliage and purple berries with yellow candles and tiny flags of the United Nations thus carrying out the colors of the Soroptimist Clubs. Small sacks of wheat and sheaves of grain were used in advertising the crops of Morrow County and the lumbering industry was displayed in souvenirs of small pine boards on which the Soroptimist pledge was printed. These were through the courtesy of the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Company of Hepner.

Among outstanding features of the program was an address by Mrs. Lillian Quarnberg who spoke on "Working For the World We Want Through the Right Spiritual Values," and Mrs. Maria Beringue, native of the Philippine Islands, who talked of education in the islands. Mrs. Beringue is one of the two foreign students attending school in Oregon through fellowships granted by the Soroptimist Clubs of this region. She is taking post-graduate work at Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland and the other, is attending the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland. Mrs. Beringue said that the common lan-

guage in the Philippines is English. She also described conditions there saying that each teacher had as many as sixty pupils in a grade with different shifts of pupils attending in the morning and afternoon. Schools there suffered greatly in the Japanese invasion during the last war with textbooks and buildings being almost completely destroyed. The Soroptimist clubs of this area have adopted a plan for sending usable textbooks to the islands. Mrs. Beringue was dressed in native costume and displayed some school and hand work made by pupils in the Philippines.

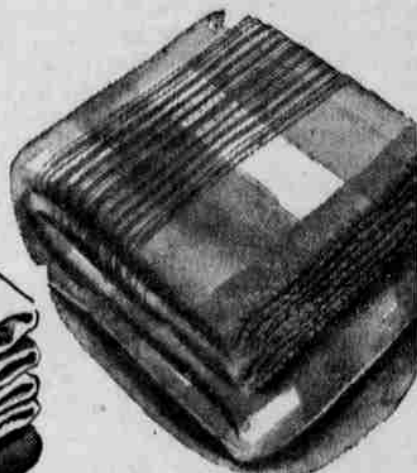
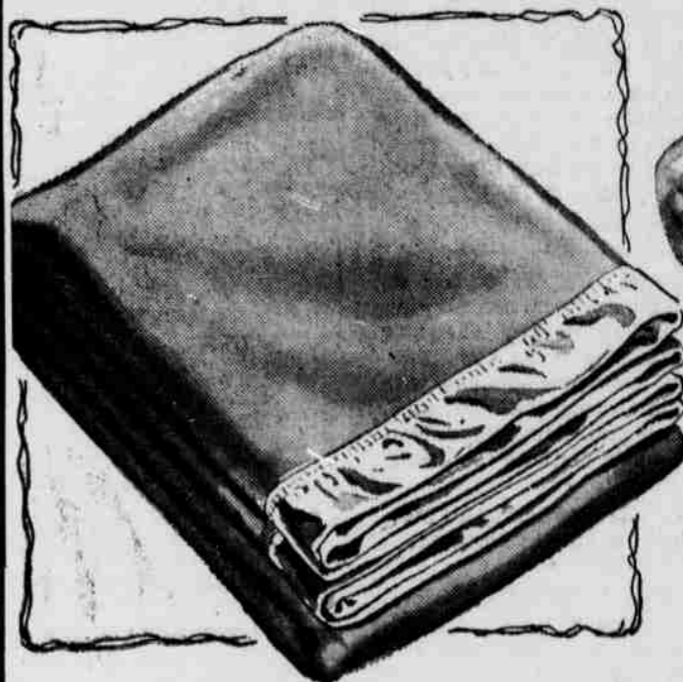
