### Easy Way To Prevent Pumphouse Freezeup

Here's a "handy" for farmers with water systems located in an outside pumphouse that might freeze and be damaged by cold weather.

M. G. Huber, Oregon State college extension agricultural engineering specialist, says the first thing to do to prevent water systems from freezing inside a building is to insulate the enclosure with 4 to 6 inches of fill insulation. Second, provide a small amount of heat.

One or two electric light bulbs, he says, connected with a simple brooder thermostat are generally adequate to prevent freezing. The bulbs-about 100 watts apieceshould be located and hung near the pump mechanism and piping.
