This is the same program of district and farmer aid that was adopted early this year at the convention of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts in Atlanta, Georgia.

Notices have been sent to all livestock growers advising them of an important and timely meeting to be held Monday evening, November 5. Bob Every, Extension Entomologist, Oregon State College, will be the speaker. To be discussed is lice and grub control in our livestock herds.

This subject should be of special interest at this time of year when livestock herds are being brought in from summer range and are handy for spraying. With winter not far away lice infestations will build up and lead to loss of body weight and discomfort to cattle. With cattle prices such as they are livestock men cannot afford to lose many pounds of beef to this preventable loss.

The insect control committee of the Morrow County Livestock Growers Association has recommended isolated control districts for the complete control of cattle grubs. This will be thoroughly explained by Mr. Every.

The meeting is sponsored by the Morrow County Livestock Growers Association. Plans for the annual meeting of the association will be discussed with the membership. The meeting is November 5, starting at 8:00 p. m. at the County Court Room.


