Holiday time is nearing and all of us want to look our best at the gay round of pretty parties and festivities. . . . If you decide your color needs a bit of 'stepping up, lean toward the pink or peach shades of make-up.

Warm left-over toast in the oven. Roll into crumbs and save in an air-tight jar to use for scalloped and au gratin dishes.

Have you tried the wonderful No-water Way to cook fresh vegetables? Allow 1 tablespoon margarine per serving and place in bottom of saucpan, top with prepared vegetable, season. Place wet lettuce leaves over vegetables; cover and cook over low heat till done, about same time as boiling water method. Vegetables are delicious, nutritious and so-o beautiful cooked this way.

Eggplant, shiny and purple-clad, is so appetizing prepared this way: Wash and slice, through skin too, about 1/2 inch thick. Spread with real mayonnaise, salt and pepper and broil about 5 minutes. Turn and repeat mayonnaise and seasonings and broil about 5 more minutes.

Dry out shoes at room temperature, never near a high heat. And remember to brush or wipe clean before giving them a going over with a good liquid or paste polish.

Favorite cookbooks take an awful beating! Protect them with an oilcloth cover and wipe clean with a damp cloth. They'll last longer.

Missionary Speaks at Christian Church

Malcolm Normet, director of the Yakima Indian Christian Mission, was guest speaker at the meeting of the Union Missionary Society at the Christian Church Friday afternoon. Normet and his wife were formerly missionaries in Paraguay, South America and in his talk he gave a vivid description of their life and work among the natives of that country. He told of the work in the leper colony there and of the splendid mission now provided by the Protestant churches of America. The leper missions were previously controlled by the government. Much of the heavy labor is done by women in this country where there are a great many more women than men; the average being approximately eleven women to one man. Mr. Normet praised the splendid work of Frank Laubach in advancing the status of the natives of Paraguay.
