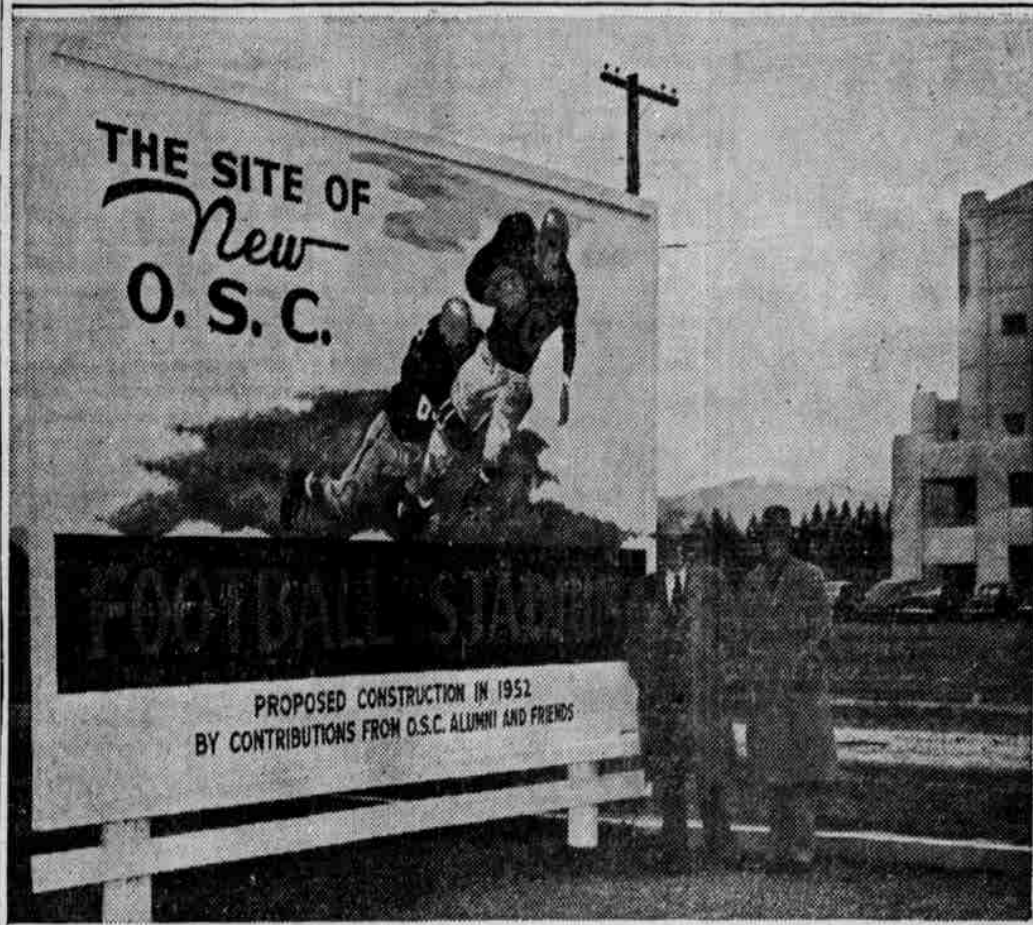


Oregon State Stadium Drive Making Headway
