## Oregon Traffic Deaths Still High

Oregon traffic killing continued unabated last month with a preliminary count listing 45 fatalities, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reported Friday.

The October toll, which brought to 365 the number of deaths recorded during the year to date, marks the third consecutive month in which fatalities reached 45 or more. At the same time last

year the death count stood at 227. September accidents took 50 lives, highest monthly toll of the year to date, and August was next highest with 48.

Oregon drivers face the double hazards of slippery roads and poor visibility brought on by weather during this month and next. Newbry reminded; twin dangers that invariably produce serious accidents. The secretary added that the outlook was dim for reducing the 428 fatalities recorded last year unless the current trend is suddenly reversed.

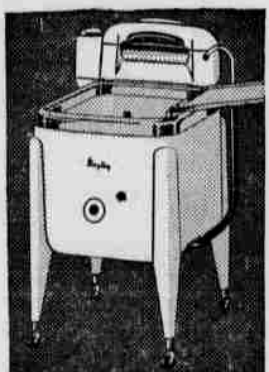
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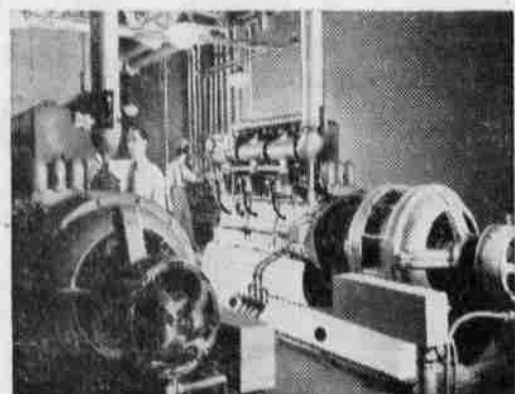
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Air Defense Filter Center: Telephone lines link these vital air defense radar posts.

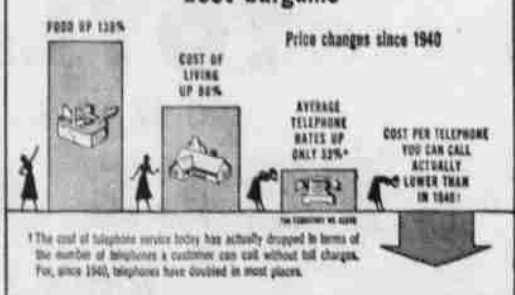
