

Mustangs Get Set for Basketball

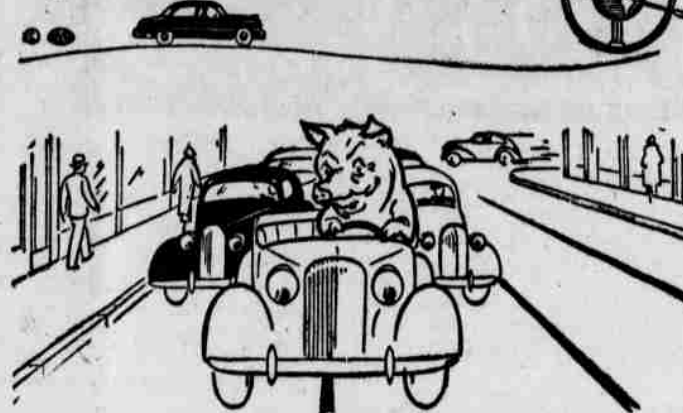

Sportsmanlike DRIVING



KNOW WHERE TO DRIVE

Traffic lane straddlers are conspicuously out of place. They remind one of the above picture.

Being called a "road-hog" isn't the worst thing that can happen to a traffic lane straddler. Sooner or later he causes an accident, says the AAA driver training book, "Sportsmanlike Driving."

Position your car—in the correct lane. Out of lane, you look untrained and ignorant of the simplest driving rules. Drive well within the curb or road-edge lane, unless you in-

tend to pass a slow car or make a left-hand turn.

It is easy to know just where your car belongs if the lane is marked on the road. If the road is unmarked, only that part that makes up your lane—usually a third or a fourth of the road width—belongs to you. Drive as though the lane were marked.

The lane position of your car should always be a correct sign to other drivers of exactly what you intend to do.

Fluorine Effect On Teeth Subject Of OSC Research

A new study related to dental health of Oregon school children soon will be added to the research program being conducted at Oregon State college.

This time, OSC scientists will look into the fluorine problem to determine what effect fluoridization of public drinking water supplies has on the teeth of school children.

The study will be made by Dr. Clark A. Storvick, professor of foods and nutrition, and Dr. Demetrios M. Hadjimarkos, dentist and associate professor of dental research.

Observations will be made over a long period, probably 12 to 14 years, to discover both immediate and long-range effects of fluorine.

The tests will be made in Corvallis where fluoridization of city water is expected to begin in January. Dr. Hadjimarkos will examine the tests of Corvallis school children just before or immediately after fluorine is added to the water. This will provide a record of the condition of the children's teeth before the fluorine has had an opportunity to do its work.

Later examinations will be made at regular intervals of about one year to show the effects of the water-treating program.

Although observations will be made in only one community, results of the examinations will be useful throughout Oregon and the nation, according to Dr. Storvick. Similar studies have been conducted in other parts of the U. S., but the OSC test will be the first of its kind in the Northwest.

The work will be financed by a special grant from the Oregon legislature for dental health research. Other projects provided for by the same grant already are under way. Included are a study of regional differences in tooth decay among Oregon school children and an investigation of the effects of selenium, a trace element, on the condition of the teeth.
