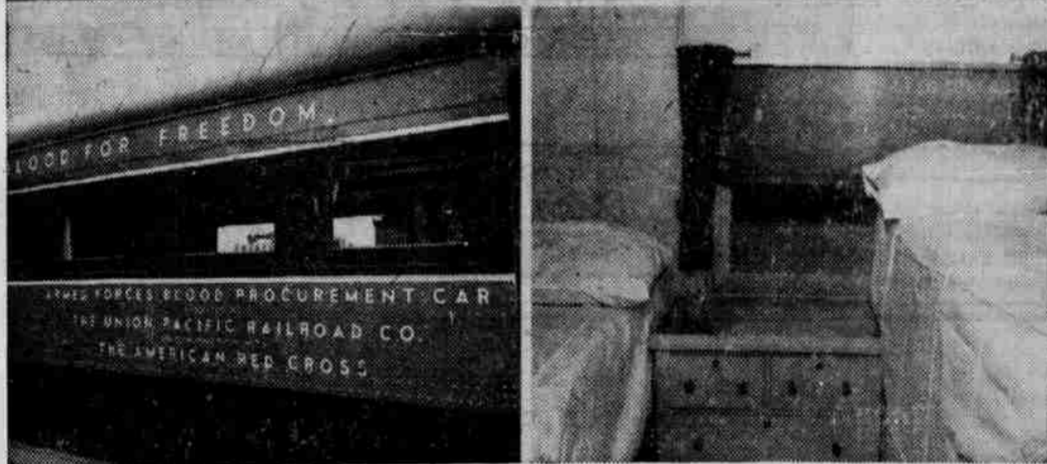
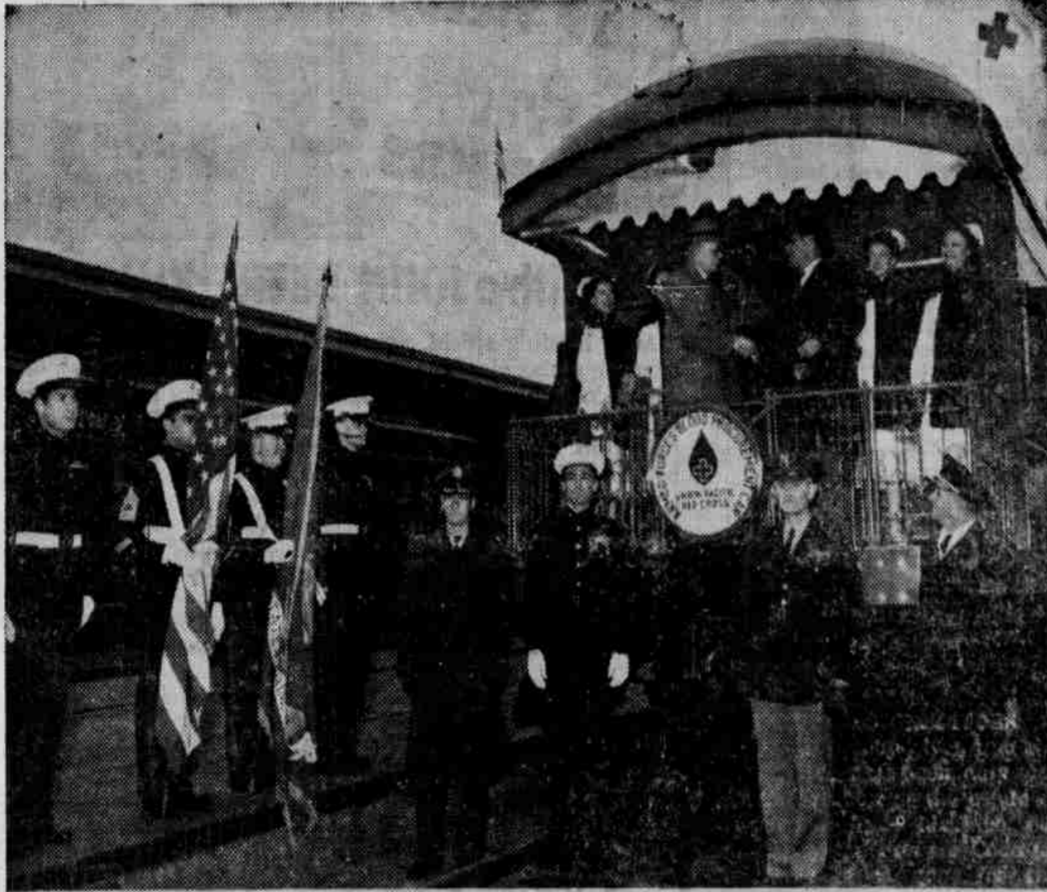
Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Boyer were business visitors in Heppner last Tuesday.
