Gene Majeske, Gene Cutsforth, Charles Buchanan and Ina Buchanan and Mrs. George Irvin of Ordinance.

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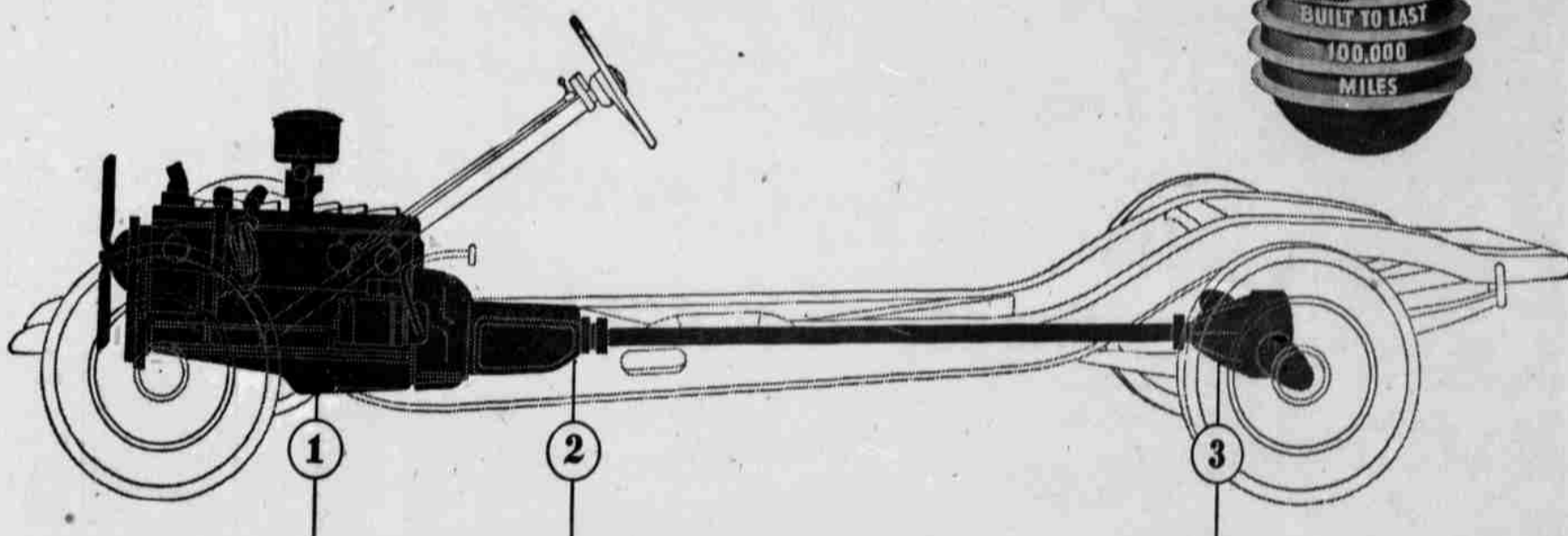
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
