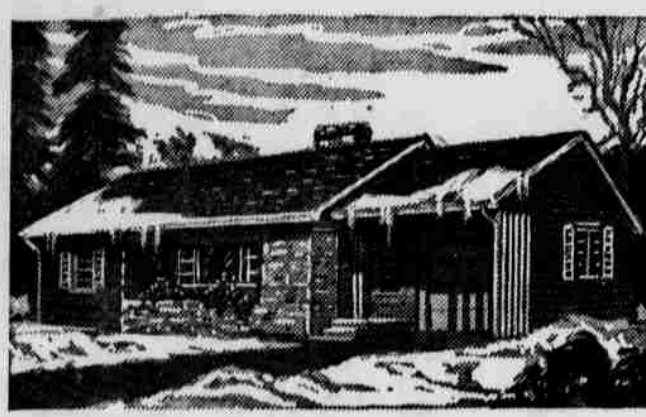
Roger Kincaid, who has been working at Ordinance, underwent an appendectomy at the St. Anthony hospital in Pendleton Monday of last week.
