### PEARL HARBOR ANNIVERSARY POINTS NEED FOR STRONG CIVIL DEFENSE

How are we prepared to meet another Pearl Harbor—one which might occur in our own cities?

On the tenth anniversary of the Pearl Harbor incident, Bradley Fancher, Morrow county civil defense director, stated that this area now has a specific set of jobs to help cope with an enemy attack which might hit anywhere in Oregon.

"Ten years ago a surprise attack was possible a few hundred miles off our shores," said Fancher. "Today, we know technological advances have made such an attack quite possible here at home. It's our job in civil defense to be ready for any eventuality."

 their investigate these laws and report back at the next meeting of livestock growers.

Roy Nelson, Theft Investigator, State Department of Agriculture, was present to report on the livestock brand law. Mr. Nelson announced the new brand book would be ready in about 6 weeks and would carry about 8500 brand recordings made up to June 31, 1951.

Dr. McKenzie appearing again on the program discussed feeding the breeding herd an adequate winter ration. He stressed the need for feeding a sufficient quantity of roughage—the colder the weather the more roughage needed. Dr. McKenzie pointed out that a vitamin A is the most important vitamin to be supplied. This is found in sufficient quantities in green hay. Protein should be supplied through the cheapest source, alfalfa hay generally being the most economical way to supply it. Dr. McKenzie stressed the need for adequate feed at breeding time extending at one month after breeding in order to supply proper nutrients for the developing embryo. Vitamin A and protein are most needed at this time as well as a month or so before calving time.
