your cooperation to make it effective. May we see you in Church Sunday?

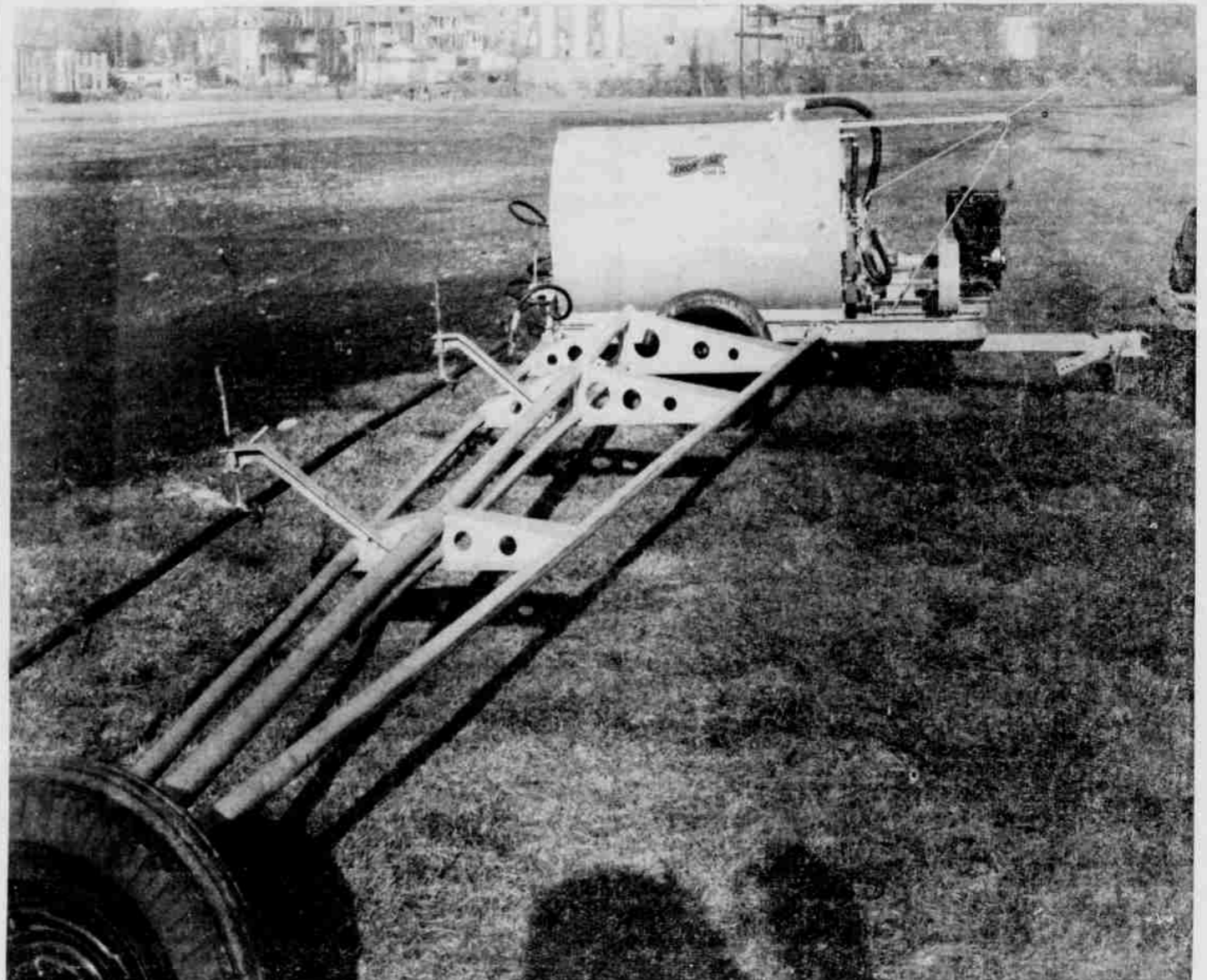
