

Who Was VICTIM X?

Victim X, whose name will never be known, was the 1,000,000th highway traffic fatality in the United States since 1900. Victim N may have been man, woman or child-it might have been you!

This life, sacrificed to carelessness, was snuffed out in an automobile accident late in 1951. Only a few months earlier, another unknown met his death on a Korean battlefield. "GI-X" was the millionth soldier to die for his country since the Battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775.
