Heppner Wins Over Arlington and Wallowa

The Heppner Mustangs came through with their 11th and 12th victories against three defeats for the season as they soundly thumped Arlington on the local floor Friday night by the score of 62-25.

Jack Sumner and Gary Connor led the attack with 25 and 17 points totals for the evening. The fouling of Jim Smith and captain Jim Prock highlighted the contest.

Saturday night's tussle with Wallowa offered the last home game of the season and proved to be one of the best as the

Mustangs upset the highly rated Wallowa five 47-46. The game was a see-saw affair throughout with both teams evenly matched. Heppner's victory came from superiority at the free-throw line.

Wallowa outgored Heppner 18 to 16 from the field but the Mustangs overcame a 4 point deficit with only two minutes remaining on the shooting of two field goals by Gary Connor followed by the game-winning free throw. Connor sank the final gift shot with 40 seconds remaining and succeeded in stalling out the remaining seconds.

Heppner now draws a 10-day respite before their next game February 12 with the Pendleton Buckaroos, and coach Harold Whitbeck indicated the boys were going to work on man to man defense during the layoff. He felt weakness in this department was responsible for the double loss to Umatilla.

Scoring for Heppner in the Wallowa game were Sumner, 8; K. Connor, 3; G. Connor, 17; Smith, 2; Prock, 11 and Taylor 6.

PROCLAMATION!
