

### County School News Notes

Boardman teachers and schools will be host to the county teachers association at a 6:30 dinner on Thursday, March 27 followed by a business meeting and panel discussion on "public relations and the school." On the panel will be a professional man, a county official, a school board member, a teacher and a school superintendent. This is the fourth meeting held by the teachers association, one being held at each school.

A regular meeting of the rural school board was held Saturday March 15 at the court house for the purpose of preparing the estimated budget for the county offices for the coming school year. Members of the budget committee present were Orville Wright, chairman, Walter Wright secretary and E. L. Rucker. The budget was accepted by the committee and is to be posted or published at a later date.

The annual meeting of all school board members, clerks, superintendents and other members of the communities as well as budget committee members will be held in Boardman during the first week in April.

Two members of the rural school board will end their term of office in 1952, they are J. J. Nys and R. Vernon Jones. Alonzo Henderson's term expires in 1953 and the terms of office of Adrian Bechtolt and Milton Morgan end in 1954.
