

The Dalles Fat Stock Show Set June 2, 3, 4

THE DALLES—With 500 entries of wheat fed steers, swine and sheep expected for the Oregon Wheat Growers League 4-H and FFA Fat Stock show and sale here June 2-3-4, price support of these animals will be more important than ever before for this Sixth Annual Sale, said Eugene Courtney, general manager of the Show Board. The sale will be held beginning at 6:30 P. M. Standard Time, June 4th.

Price support pledges from Eastern Oregon buyers will be solicited this year by Lea Phillips of The Dalles, member of the Auction Sales Committee. Mr. Phillips first meeting on his Eastern Oregon tour will be at Pendleton, May 19th, with Raphael R. Raymond of Helix, Vice-Chairman of the Youth Activities Committee of the Oregon Wheat Growers League. They will also meet with 4-H leaders and FFA advisors to determine the number of exhibitors and their exhibits from Umatilla County. From Pendleton Mr. Phillips will go on to other Eastern Oregon communities expected to have a substantial number of animals at the show.

As in previous years, members of the Sales Committees are obtaining support pledges from the business men of The Dalles.

Mr. Courtney emphasized the importance of developing area wide price support for show animals since it is expected more than twice as many animals will be shown this year as at the 1951 show. This Show has been outstanding in its maintenance of prices well above market levels, the general manager added.

Candidates for the Academies must have reached their 17th but not their 22nd birthday by July 1st of the calendar year (1953) in which they enter the Academies.
