This was at the Women's Club last night. Then Duke Thomas stepped up—his cake was Number 4! Seems his missus was laid up, so Duke took over—and won!

Here's Duke's prize-winning frosting recipe:

Melt 3 squares unsweetened chocolate in double boiler. Remove from heat, add 1 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar and 2 1/2 lbs. hot water and blend. Add 3 egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Add 4 lbs. butter, beating thoroughly after each lbs. Fills and frosts 8-inch, 3-layer cake.

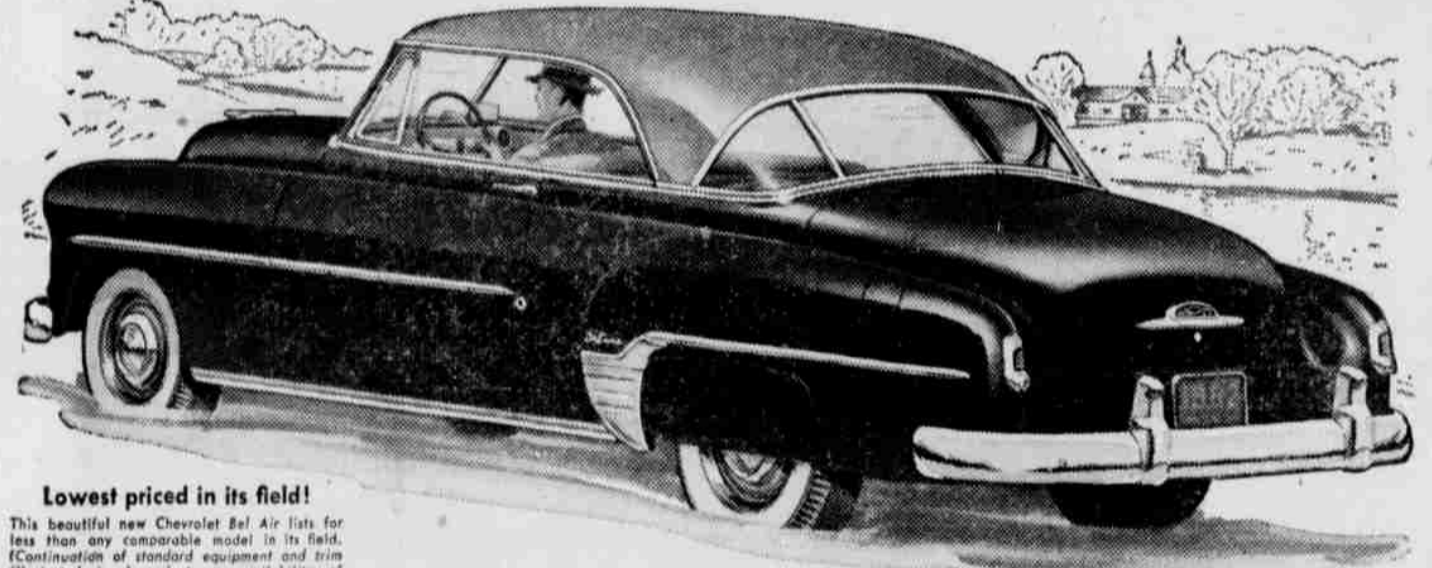
