## Rev. Cornelison Speaks To Union Missionary

Rev. J. M. Cornelison, Pendleton, was guest speaker at the meeting of the Union Missionary Society Friday afternoon in the Methodist church. Rev. Cornelison traced the history of missionary work among the Indians of the Oregon territory from the time when the four braves of the Nez Perce tribe arrived in Fort St. Louis in 1831, seeking the white man's book of Heaven, until the present time. For forty three years, Rev. Cornelison was Presbyterian missionary to the Indians at Tuitalla Mission near Pendleton and has made an extensive study of the language and customs of the Indians. Much of his talk was of his personal experiences and he stated that the same story could be told on any one of the missionaries of the several denominations who are working with the Indians, teaching them new agricultural and domestic methods as well as educational and spiritual values. Rev. Cornelison still serves as Presbyterian moderator at the mission although he retired from active duty as a missionary some ten years ago. In concluding his address, he sang two songs in Nez Perce, quoted some scripture and gave the benediction in Indian.

The program also included a solo "When I'm With Him", by Mrs. Robert Walker, accompanied by Mrs. Lucille Owens; scripture reading by Miss Opal Briggs who also reported on recent news of the Charles Notson family; and the invocation by the Rev.
