Van Wert of Farmers Hybrid Hogs, Hampton, Ia., whose geneticists bred the parent stock for high fertility. Meyers raised the pigs on Terralac, the synthetic sow's milk which is effective because it contains terramycin, and fed them pig starter with a high level of terramycin to bring them to the championship weight. The litter is expected to weigh more than 2 tons at 6 months. Before the synthetic milk was discovered last year, a 6-months' weight of 1 ton was regarded as near perfection.
