

COURT PROCEEDINGS

Court Proceedings for May, 1952, Term.

The minutes of the April term were read and approved. The Court agrees to help the District Attorney in the enforcement of the willful waste of irrigation water on the County Roads. The Court also agrees to help him in enforcing the law regarding the dumping of garbage and rubbish on all county roads.

The Court ordered the Morrow County Treasurer to issue a check in the amount of \$4,174.25, payable to Barney B. Helsler in payment for crushed rock and charge the same against the Road Trust Fund.

The Court published a call for bids in the Heppner Gazette Times for the oiling of 3.7 miles of the Lexington-Blackhorse county road and 4.5 miles of the lone-Gooseberry county road with all bids to be opened May 23, 1952. The Court awarded the contract for the oiling to the Russell Olson Construction Company.

<p>KNOW YOUR BOAT</p> <p>Every boat has its limitations. Learn what you can expect from your boat.</p>	<p>HEAD INTO THE WAVES</p> <p>If waves are high, head your boat at an angle towards the waves at slow speed.</p>	<p>BALANCE YOUR LOAD</p> <p>Distribute weight evenly in the boat—from side to side and from bow to stern.</p>
<p>WATCH THE WEATHER</p> <p>Head for shore before a storm breaks. If caught out, seat passengers on floor.</p>	<p>DON'T OVERLOAD</p> <p>Seats do not indicate capacity. Two or three adults may be a full load under many conditions.</p>	<p>USE THE RIGHT MOTOR</p> <p>Too much power can damage your boat—may even swamp it. Look for OBC recommended horsepower plate.</p>
<p>AVOID SHARP TURNS</p> <p>Fast, sharp turns are hard on equipment—and sometimes on people.
